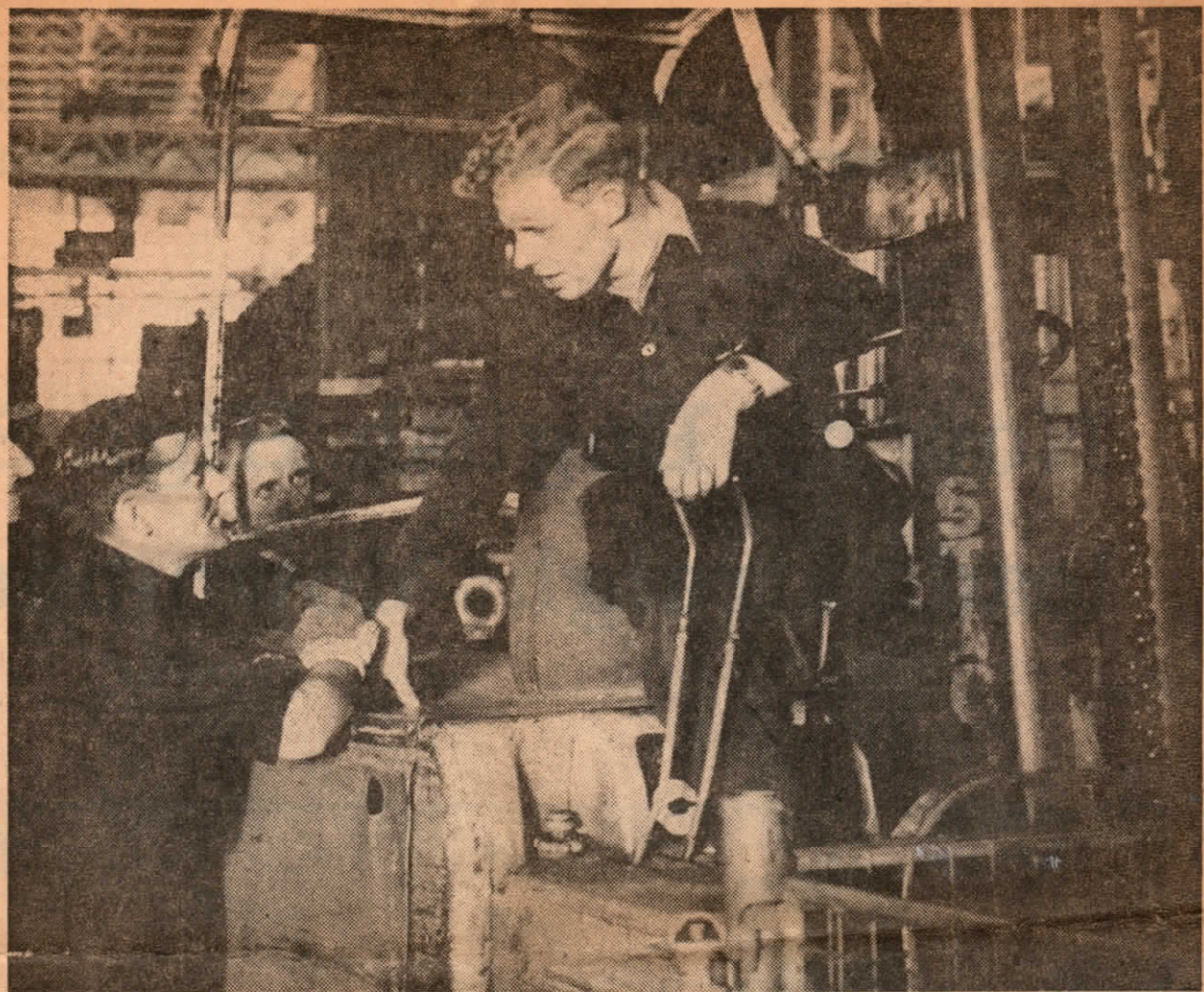




### THE PRIEST AT THE LATHE
